Follow-up: Collection Policy

The Board approved the new collection policy at their last meeting on July 26, 2023 unmodified as I described it in the last newsletter. In case you didn't get the last newsletter, it can be found on bphoa, click 2023, then Newsletter and then 2023 July - August Newsletter. The new Collection policy can also be found at bphoa, click 2023, then Collection Policy.

If you owe a balance, **please** either pay off your balance or contact our property manager, Joe Gains at joe.gains@goodwintx.com or call him at: (512) 734-4113 to get on a payment plan. It costs nothing to get on a payment plan. (Paul Goldfine and I negotiated this with Goodwin as they normally charge for payment plans.) The most current numbers have 36 homeowners owing a balance. Of those, six have balances greater than \$1,000 and another four are getting close to that amount. The total owed to the Association is: \$26,823.25.

In addition, Goodwin is in the process of sending out notices to everyone about the new collections policy. As part of this, the Board has asked Goodwin to attach a letter to those who owe a balance and let them know that the Board is extending one last bit of benevolence through December 31, 2023 to those who owe a balance, especially those who owe more than \$1,000. If they get on a payment plan, then serious procedures and the associated costs will not be implemented per the collection policy. However, the homeowner MUST complete the payment plan successfully or the lenience will end and serious collection procedures will immediately begin to the maximum allowable by Texas law.

com with the subject "Curb Painting" and we'll get that done.



Vacant Board member position

Just after the last Board meeting, the Board declared the Director position held by Vincent Falcon vacant in accordance with Article VII, Section 1.(d) of the By Laws of the Owners Association of Bradford Park, Inc. Mr. Falcon has been absent from three consecutive Board meetings: March 29, 2023, May 31, 2023 and July 26, 2023. He was also absent from the Annual Meeting on February 21, 2023. The Board will appoint a new Director in accordance with Section 209.00593 of Texas Law as well as Article IV, Section 4. of the By Laws of the Owners Association of Bradford Park, Inc. (Note: Texas Law supercedes our By Laws.)

- 1. Keep your valuables CLOSE at all times. Keep your cell phone on your person, NOT in your purse! You can't call for help if you have no phone! Robbers are opportunists, so don't give them the opportunity.
- 2. Be aware of your surroundings at all times. This is known as "situational awareness". If you see something hinky, divert from your intended route or hurry to get to a safe area. Don't confront a bad guy on your own!
- 3. ALWAYS notify the police and file a police report!! I can't say this enough!
- **4. Keep an eye out.** If you see something hinky, call the police. That's why they are there!

School Bus Safety Tips

Now that students are back in school please be aware of school bus rules, respect the speed limits posted while children are waiting at bus stops, crossing the roads, and walking to and from school. Please take extra precaution.

According to Texas statute, a driver – traveling in either direction on a roadway – must stop when approaching a school bus that is stopped and operating a visual signal. The driver may not proceed until one of the following occurs: the school bus resumes motion; the operator is signaled by the bus driver to proceed; or the visual signal is no longer activated.

If a road is divided only by a left-turning lane, drivers on both sides of the roadway must stop for school buses with alternating red flashing lights activated. However, if the lanes are separated by an intervening space or physical barrier, only motorists traveling in the same direction as the bus are required to stop.

Fall Tips for Gardening

- To minimize the likelihood of weeds this fall, do not allow weeds to go to seed.
- Plant shade trees now to take advantage of the mild fall and winter weather for root growth.
- Prepare beds to plant cool season flowers. Add compost as needed to your flowerbeds.
- Deadhead flowering plants to stimulate more blooms.
- This is the last time to fertilize roses for the winter months. Wait until January or February to fertilize again.
- With the mild weather, it's a perfect time to plant landscapes. The cooling temperatures allow for more root growth, which will establish the plant before winter cold snaps.
- Take advantage of the weather and dig, divide and plant your spring/summer blooming perennials.
- Begin to back off on watering. With the cooler temperatures, soils stay moist longer than they did this summer. You do not want to overwater your plants.
- Mulch all new plantings to reduce weeds, maintain soil moisture and regular soil temperatures.
- This will be the last time to do any pruning on your rose bushes until February.
- Sow bluebonnets and other wildflowers.
- Make preparation to protect tropical plants or move them to a greenhouse.
- Prepare exposed pipes for winter.
- After last use of your lawn mower or other power equipment, make the machines ready for winter storage. Don't leave gasoline in the machine over winter.
- Start thinking about purchasing fall planting/spring blooming bulbs. Don't plant until hot weather is over.
- Prune trees when they are dormant.
